April 20, 2011

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
Middlesex and Gloucester

Severe Weather Struck the Following Areas between 7 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. on Saturday, April 16:

- Ware Neck in Gloucester (EF3 Tornado, on enhanced Fujita scale, with estimated winds of 136-165 mph)
- Coke in Gloucester (EF3 Tornado)
- Deltaville in Middlesex (EF2 Tornado, winds of 111-135 mph)





VDOT Response

Saturday Evening

- VDOT's Traffic Operations Center notified Saluda Residency
 Maintenance Manager about debris and blocked lanes on U.S. 17 near
 Page Middle School, possible tornado touchdown
 - Saluda Residency mobilized all available equipment and employees
 - Coordinated with area emergency responders to make all roads passable for search and rescue operations
 - Overnight, arranged for work crews and equipment to report to work locations at sunrise Sunday morning

Sunday

 Debris removal started at sunrise on Sunday, and remains underway until all travel lanes and right-of-way is clear





Challenges in Response

Narrow Tornado Path

- Multiple responders worked in tight spaces on two-lane secondary roads covered with trees, debris and downed power lines
- VDOT cannot remove trees or debris until power lines are removed or de-energized
- Virginia State Police provided traffic control to limit interference from the public "touring" the damage
- Oversize work vehicles and equipment from multiple agencies had to take turns maneuvering in confined spaces

Initial Damage and Debris Assessments

Assessment for VDOT Expenses

Gloucester: \$252,000

Middlesex: \$80,000

Estimates for VDOT Collected Debris

Gloucester: 5,200 cubic yards

Middlesex: 1,600 cubic yards

Status of Cleanup

Forward Plan

- Middlesex County is 100 percent complete
- Remaining crews have deployed to Gloucester County, which is 70 percent complete. Estimated completion by Friday.
- Traffic signal timing at U.S. 17 and Ark Road to be coordinated for new arrival and dismissal times at Peasley Middle School.
