Background

The 17-member Commonwealth Transportation Board appointed by the Governor meets on the third Thursday of each month. The Board is primarily responsible for locating routes, approving construction contracts, creating traffic regulations, naming highways and administering and allocating the Transportation Trust Fund. Virginia Secretary of Transportation Shirley Ybarra is chairperson of the Board.

Since the year 2000, VDOT has experienced record seasons for construction activity. Including the projects built under the Public-Private Partnership Act, VDOT has an average of 600 or more contracts worth nearly \$3 billion under way at any one time, the most aggressive construction program in Virginia's history.

The boost in construction activity is largely due to Governor Gilmore's Innovative Progress program. A critical part of that program is the Commonwealth Transportation Act, which pumped an additional \$3 billion into transportation programs, making for a record total of \$10 billion over a six-year period.

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
